

Kathleen Stassen Berger completed her undergraduate education at Stanford University and Radcliffe College, earned her M.A.T. from Harvard University and an M.S. and Ph.D. from Yeshiva University. Her broad range of experience as an educator includes directing a preschool, teaching philosophy and humanities at the United Nations International School, teaching child and adolescent development to graduate students at Fordham University, teaching inmates earning paralegal degrees at Sing Sing Prison, and teaching undergraduates at both Montclair State University and Quinnipiac University. She has also been involved in education as the president of Community School Board in District Two in Manhattan. For over three decades, Berger has taught human development at Bronx Community College of the City University of New York. The students Kathleen Berger teaches every year come from diverse ethnic, economic, and educational

backgrounds representing a wide range of interests and consistently honor her with the highest teaching evaluations.

I have taken a lot of classes. This book is just so generic text book it's boring. It is also ridiculously heavy. There are pictures that the authors use to ask questions to engage critical thinking. They are so tiny it's hard to even look at them and see the details they are describing.
