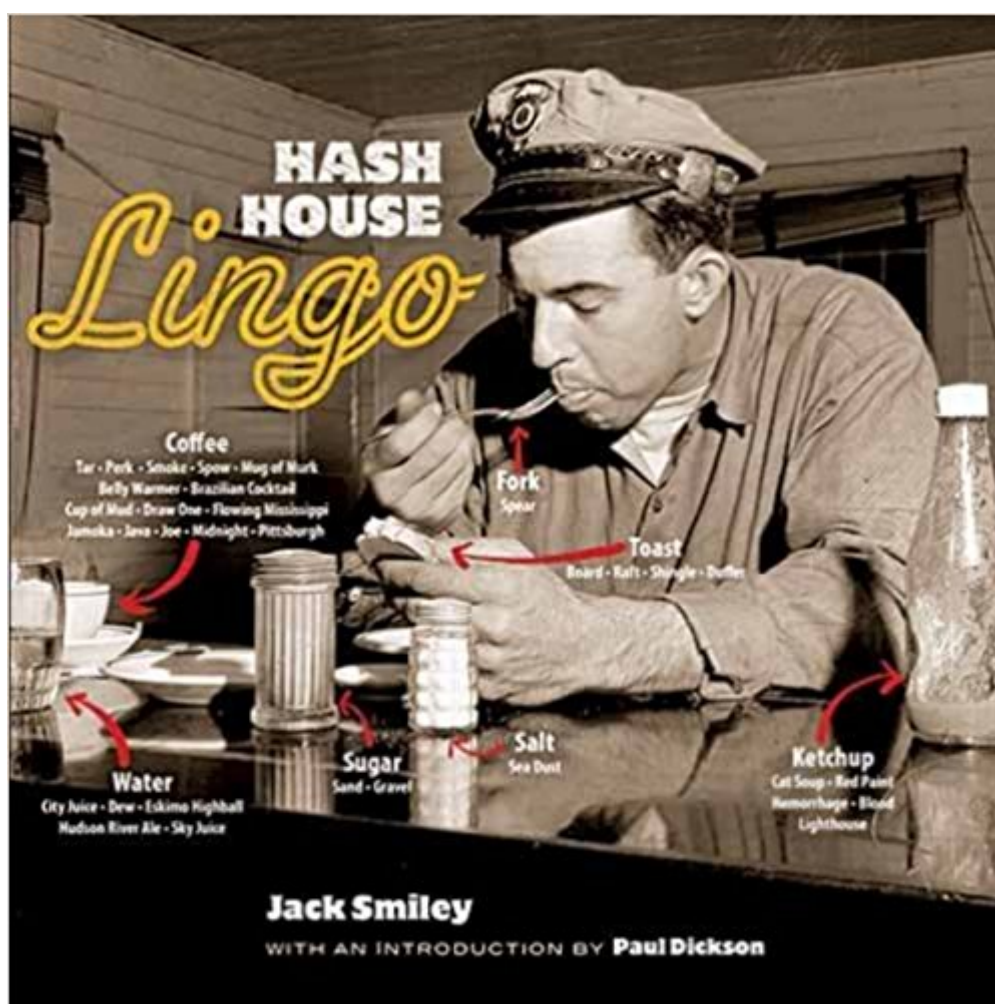

I got such a kick out of this book and have read it over and over. You'll learn the origin of such diner calls as "Adam and Eve on a raft...and wreck 'em!" for scrambled eggs on toast, and "Sinkers and Suds" for coffee and doughnuts. What a great compilation of slang used in bygone days! (Actually, some terms are very much still in use among the general public, such as "O.J" for orange juice, "fresh meat" to describe a new employee and "86'ed" to denote that something is gone.) Anyone who is interested in language should quite enjoy this little gem.

This is a fun read -- not as comprehensive as I might have liked, but it was probably not intended to be a scholarly work to begin with. Some of the photos are very nice. Over all, a nice jaunt through a certain area of a certain era.

down memory lane.
