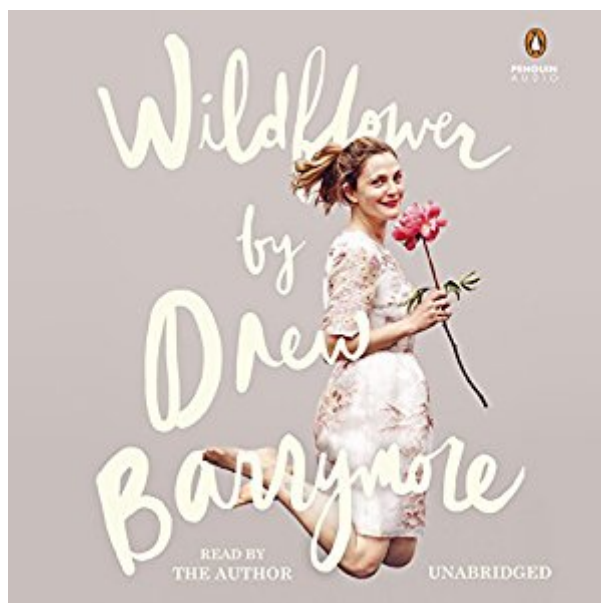

I loved this book! Each chapter is its own short story and to be honest that format worked perfect for this sleep deprived mother of a 5 month old (and a 4 year old too!). Her wit and charm come across as does humility. I love listening to people tell their interesting life stories, famous or not, and she comes across as a friend just telling you something in an interesting way. I definitely recommend this book!

I really enjoyed this book. It is not a complete memoir--Drew Barrymore is after all the mother of young children and has a lot of life yet to live. But it is a series of stories about her life, bits and pieces and scenes that have been important to her and which reveal something of her upbringing,

her career, her feelings, her relationships, and her humanitarian efforts. The voice is authentic; it feels like the reader is sitting in a room with her having a conversation. My only problem with the book is that it could have used a little more editing. At one point she talks about making a movie for several pages in great detail, but never mentions the title of the movie. I had to go on the Internet and look it up to find out what she was talking about. That doesn't usually happen in a professionally edited and published book. But overall, I enjoyed WILDFLOWER very much and feel that I know Drew Barrymore a lot better than I did.

I have always enjoyed Drew Barrymore's movies and remember her as a wild child in her younger days. She tells her stories of different times in her life and discusses how she got through the tough times and came out better for living through them. The book isn't written chronologically but skips back and forth in time which is a bit confusing. I did like the parts of the book when she talked about motherhood and her children because she seems so sincere about how she loves her two girls, Olive and Frankie. The same affections were expressed for her husband, but it was sad to recently hear that they are divorcing. Drew seems to be an impulsive person who makes up her mind to go to another country and within hours she's on a plane headed to India or Africa. She grew up with little parental involvement in her life but by age 6 she was cast in the movie "E.T. Extraterrestrial." In some passages about movies she is so involved with talking about her admiration for certain actors and producers that I think she overdoes it a bit.. From what she says in the book, she does pour heart and soul into what she takes on, and takes her work seriously. There are some very humorous parts in the book as well as serious and even sad ones. I enjoyed the book, but would have liked it better had it not skipped around so much in time.
