Also, although Allie faces challenges and insecurities, she still demonstrates strength and self confidence by assertively confronting rude kids in her class, nurturing a loving relationship with her sister and bisabuelo, and demonstrating a deep, natural appreciation for her Mexican-American roots. A great role model indeed.

So many important and timely themes are touched upon and/or dealt with in depth in Allie First At Last. What the author does exceptionally well is to create such warm, interesting and genuine

characters that as a reader I just want to see them all get what they want and I don't even realize I am learning these life lessons. Sibling rivalry is a dominant theme--what middle school child wouldn't benefit from reading about that? But also there are tremendous examples of friend relationships and of cross-generational respect and love within a family. The author does a great job of creating an interesting story line to keep the reader engaged and then propelling the reader forward with nice pacing. Her touches of humor add so much to the reading experience. This book would be an excellent starting point to engage a child in discussion with family. In a classroom situation it could stimulate expression of many viewpoints which might through discussion be sorted out in a non-threatening way. Most of all, I found this book to be an enjoyable read and I would highly recommend it.

Allie, First at Last shares the same qualities that I found so endearing about Cervantes' previous book, Gaby, Lost and Found. I love how this author captures the drama of family relationships and school friendships. She understands what the dynamics are like for grade school kids and shows a real sympathy for the emotions and challenges of her characters. There are some very funny moments, and others that are truly poignant. I appreciate that the story contains admirable adults who play an important role in their kids' lives as well as strong friendships between the young characters. It's nice to see something besides dysfunctional parents and mean girls! My 9-year-old daughter enjoyed both books and we're looking forward to more!

I adored "Gaby, Lost and Found," and the author's second book did not disappoint! Full of extremely vibrant and lovable characters, readers will be able to relate to Allie's frustrations as she strives to be #1 at something. I laughed and cried a lot throughout the entire novel.
