Mongolia is a misterious country for the western traveler --not to say the western reader. Charles Rice's book presents numerous vignettes about the country from the point of view of a journalist trainer. His notes are clearly written and highly enjoyable: he is always respectful and inquisitive about the Mongolian culture and shows an ambition to learn about this people. The details about the Mongolian lifestyle (the cuisine, places, society, events) are quite captivating: there are anecdotes about intricate roads, strange encounters, rare animals, extreme weather, the life in Ulan Baatar...!
